

PARQUE DAS NAÇÕES

Parque Nações is a civil parish in eastern Lisbon. Previously an industrial area, it was remodeled into an avant-garde architectural business center. A mixture of green spaces and glass-walled buildings, Parque das Nações is perhaps the most modern part of the city.

Lisbon Orient Station (*Gare do Oriente*). Inaugurated in 1998 for the Expo'98 world's fair, this modern station is a preeminent train, bus and metro terminal. Offering travel connections with the entire country, it also connects Lisbon to international routes by train and by bus. Due to its hectic activity, it is equipped with a shopping center and a police station.

FIL – Feira Internacional de Lisboa. With a total area of 100.000m², this multifunctional complex is destined to organizing events. It is usually where the main events happening in Lisbon take place. In 2010, FIL hosted the NATO Summit Lisbon.

Altice Arena. With a capacity for 20,000 people, the Altice Arena is a multi-purpose indoor arena. It was built for the Expo'98 and every year is home to various cultural events in the city. Since 2016, the Altice Arena has accommodated Web Summit, the annual technology conference.

Gondola Lift Lisbon (*Telecabine Lisboa*) is a must-visit attraction is the recreational part of the city. Connecting the north and the south areas of the Parque das Nações, the trip lasts from 8 to 12 minutes. At 30 meters from the ground, the cable cars hover over the river for over 1km.

Lisbon Oceanarium (*Oceanário de Lisboa*). The modernistic aquarium is representation of the long and harmonious relationship between Lisbon and the ocean. Visited by a million people every year, the oceanarium promotes the discussion about the ocean and marine species.



Pavilhão do Conhecimento is an interactive science and technology museum. Its main goal is to make Science and Technology more accessible to its audience.

Casino de Lisboa. This cosmopolitan casino is destined for an older crowd. From music, art and gambling, this modern piece of architecture offers a variety of leisure activities.

Vasco da Gama Bridge (*Ponte Vasco da Gama*). Named after one of the most important figures of the Portuguese Discoveries, the Vasco da Gama Bridge connects Lisbon to the southern bank of the Tagus river. Built five hundred years after the arrival of the discoverer Vasco da Gama to India, it is one of the longest bridges in the world. When it opened in 1998, it was the longest bridge in Europe, with a total length of 17km.
